Spiritual Practice of Study

June is a wonderful time of year in Northern Wisconsin. Winter has gone, Spring is done, and Summer begins. I know many of you have already planned your summer fun bucket lists and things you want to do during this short season of the year for us. Perhaps you have made a summer reading list. Perhaps not, but either way, I want to encourage you to add daily Bible reading to your list this summer. This Spring in worship, we explored six Spiritual Practices that can help us grow in our awareness of and responsiveness to the presence of God in our lives, and reading the Bible is an excellent practice.

Throughout the Christian Tradition, we have understood the Bible to be the primary revelation of God available to us. That means that if we want to know God, understand what it means to be in a relationship with God, or what God expects of us, the Bible is the first place to look. I also believe that all that we need for our faith is found in the Bible. This is especially true when we intentionally seek to study the Bible to grow our relationship with God.

I know that for many of us, the Bible is intimidating; parts are hard to read, and much of it is hard to understand. Yet I know that each of us has a particular part of the Bible that we hold at the very core of ourselves, favorite verses or passages that help form the foundation of our faith. If we keep practicing reading the Bible, I know that the challenging parts will grow smaller, and you will find more special passages. As I mentioned in worship, it only takes 10 minutes to read your Bible.

To help us find the Bible more accessible and understandable, I want to share some Bible-reading tips.

1. Pray! Always start with prayer, invite God to be with you, and help you as you read the Bible.
2. Set a consistent time every day. This is one of the best tips. If you have time set aside, it will be easier to get started reading.

3. Don't get hung up on finding the right version of the Bible. Instead, find one that you like and is easy to read. All the readily available versions are wonderful.

4. Read from various parts of the Bible. I don't recommend trying to start at Genesis and trying to read straight through. Instead, read some from the Old Testament, the Psalms, and the New Testament to keep yourself engaged. Feel free to use one of the numerous reading plans available, but you don't have to.

5. Pray again! Talk to God about what you just read, ask God the questions, and keep praying.

6. Attend a Bible Study class when they are available. Our practice of Bible reading can be significantly enhanced when we do it together.

I hope these tips help you in your study of the Bible this summer. I pray that you will be filled with the presence of God as you read the story of God and humanity.

Stephen Ministry, Ministry Council Meeting Summary



Listening

What is a Stephen Minister? First and foremost, a Stephen Minister is a Christian who listens. A Stephen Minister does not give advice, does not judge, does not try to fix it, but instead, listens with all their heart. "In listening, all of us can take our cues from what may be the most important three paragraphs on listening outside the Bible, the section on 'the ministry of listening' in Dietrich Bonhoeffer's *Life Together* and Janet Dunn's classic *Discipleship Journal* article, 'How to Become a Good Listener'.

Why is listening so important?

*"The best ministry you might do today
is to listen to someone's pain
all the way to the bottom."*

According to [Dietrich] Bonhoeffer, there are many times when 'listening can be a greater service than speaking.' God wants more of the Christian than just our good listening, but not less. There will be days when the most important ministry we do is square our shoulders to some hurting person, uncross our arms, lean forward, make eye contact, and hear their pain all the way to the bottom. Says Dunn, 'Good listening often defuses the emotions that are a part of the problem being discussed. Sometimes releasing these emotions is all that is needed to solve the problem. The speaker may neither want nor expect us to say anything in response.'

One of Dunn's counsels for cultivating good listening is: 'put more emphasis on affirmation than on answers. . . . [Many times God simply wants to use me as a channel of his affirming love as I listen with compassion and understanding.' Bonhoeffer echoes, 'Often a person can be helped merely by having someone who will listen to him seriously.' At times what our neighbor needs most is for someone else to know."

Ministry Council Meeting Summary

The Ministry Council met on May 16, 2023, with the following members in attendance: Chris Anderson, Jim Anderson, Sue Claflin, Mary Fasse, Pastor Mark Gilbert, Merry Jorgensen, Dave Kozeluh, Sara Kozeluh, Sue Loeffler, Holly Nash, Bob Schuld, and Jerry Weber. Donna Clark and Noah Lottig were absent.

Highlights from the past month were noted: The Remix Parables Bible Study has been well attended; Over \$2,000 was raised for missions at the United Women in Faith's Spring Rummage & Bake Sale; the perennial garden was redone by Holly Nash; half of the vegetable garden was planted; Mary Fasse and twenty volunteers provided food and volunteered to host the May 9th Community Table; the lower level closets were cleaned out; new shelving was built in the lower level for church record storage; Wednesday Church School ended.

Ministry Council continues its work on the church's annual calendar. Initial plans are underway for a July 9th church picnic; resuming Friday night eating out at restaurants (Odd Couples); an August 6th Pancake Breakfast; Brat & Hotdog Sale at Trig's on August 26th to raise funds for "Stuff the School Bag" mission; Fall outing for hiking and biking on the Bear Skin, games at the church, and a potluck on October 1st.

Other business to be continued: Revise the Winter Weather Policy; Determine how to evaluate the outdoor summer worship program; and explore additional income streams for the church.

The Generations organization toured the church facility, as they are looking for a new location to hold their programs. However, it was determined there is not enough parking to accommodate their needs.

Ministry Council is exploring a new mission focus for the church and will continue discussion at the June meeting. Until a new focus area for missions is determined, a hold has been placed on the general missions fund. New allocations will be made once we have determined the new mission focus areas. Contributions to the general missions fund can still be made to the church.

The church signs regarding the wearing of face coverings have been removed. New signage will ask people to remain at home if they are ill, and will also let people know that face coverings are available for those who want to use them.

The next meeting is scheduled for June 20th at 7:00 p.m. in the Ministry Center.

Caritas

Donations given in May and June will be matched up to \$5,000 each month by an anonymous donor.

St. Matthias Episcopal Church's major service mission, Caritas distributes funds to those in urgent and immediate need of assistance. Caritas is the Latin work meaning charity, the Christian concept of spiritual and brotherly love for all people.

The many ways of assisting clients is evolving. Some of the assistance includes: medications, duplicate drivers licenses, work boots/clothing, and household items, furniture and auto repairs. Caritas may assist with utility bills or gasoline purchases.

These particular needs are evaluated on a case-by-case basis and a client must always be present for an interview.

Clients agree that Caritas provides more than money and referrals. They listen, offer compassion, problem solving, and more importantly, they offer hope to those who are in desperate need.

United Methodist Family and Children's Services provides services predominately for the poor and focus on crisis intervention, rebuilding lives, and strengthening families. These ministries are very dependent on contributions from the Conference and congregations since they are used as matching funds to obtain foundation, business and government grants. Services are in the areas of head-start programs, life-skill training, homeless shelters, food pantries, gang prevention, nutrition education, parenting training, and transitional living.

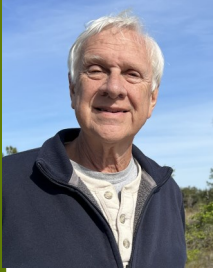

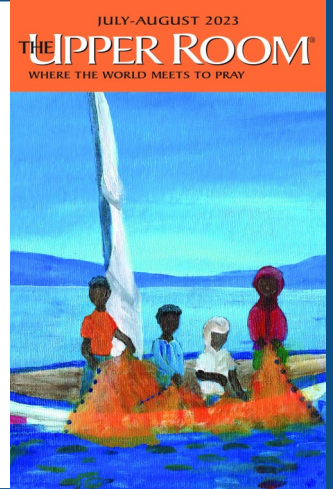
